Every dog owner's responsibility. There is nothing more

pleasurable than taking your loyal companion for a walk, to enjoy the change in seasons and we are so lucky to have such a network of footpaths and open spaces on our doorstep. Our network of footpaths is enjoyed not only by us but also by those who appreciate the Hertfordshire Way which passes through and skirts our village.

So when you take a walk and discover bags filled with poo hanging on a tree, or step on uncollected poo in your open toe sandals, or stuck in the heavy tread of your walking boots the anger and frustration is palpable – especially if you are not a dog owner.



Little Oak Heath is in danger of becoming a health hazard. The pathways leading to this oasis in the heart of the village adjacent to the playground is littered with dog poo and disguarded poo bags which people haven't placed in the "Dog Poo Bin" provided or taken it home.

As a consequence of the inconsideration of the few, the village will now be patrolled by a dog warden who has the powers to charge those who do not 'bag it and bin it' with a £1000 fine and also anyone spot checked while out with their dog/dogs who are not carrying at least 2 poo bags per dog with a fine of £75.

So bag the poo, bin it either in the Dog Poo bin provided or when you get home. Keep the countryside tidy and enjoy your walks with your best 4 legged friend.

Rectors Letter

Dear Friends,

One of the things I do in my role as parish priest is to play a part in the training and equipping of future generations of church leaders. Over the last ten years, our three parishes have hosted a number of "ordinands" trainee priests – from Oak Hill Theological College in Southgate where I did my training (and where John Risby and Jim Ledger also did theirs). Some of the students have joined us largely on Sundays for a whole academic year, whilst others have accompanied me on all my travels for an intensive period of a week or two. Whilst learning themselves about Christian ministry, the students have all brought different skills and wisdom into our setting. Widford folk might particularly remember Daniel who was with me when my left hand was out of action following the curious incident with the dog (in the daytime) – and how he cut up the food on my plate at the Safari Supper because I couldn't do it! That kind of servant-heartedness is an essential quality in a Christian leader and is after the example of Christ who said, "Even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

We've also had non-Anglican students from All Nations Christian College at Easneye working with us over the last couple of years, and next year I will be acting as supervisor to an ordinand on placement from the Eastern Region Ministry Course. His brief is to explore the challenges and opportunities that are presented by a set-up like ours – where one minister is responsible for more than one parish. He has had no experience of this, so I'm looking forward to shedding some light on it for him and hearing his reflections afterwards.

So far, we've met just once so that I could give him a bit of a flavour of the benefice. I spent last Saturday morning driving him to the furthest reaches of the three parishes Continues over leaf

So far, we've met just once so that I could give him a bit of a flavour of the benefice. I spent last Saturday morning driving him to the furthest reaches of the three parishes and showing him the church buildings and other aspects of the villages and their community life. He noticed for himself that there's only one shop and we talked a little about how this affects residents, particularly in restricting the social support network available to them. Conversations like this always give me an opportunity to celebrate the work of volunteers who work extremely hard to keep community life going – like Parish Councillors, Village Hall Trustees and those who organise clubs for different interest groups. (Thank you to them!). As it happened, on our travels we were treated in all three villages to a wonderful example of the quiet, behind-the-scenes support that some people offer to our communities. I'd like to mention it here as a way of encouraging broader gratitude.



News from the Parish Council

The planning process for the new development north of Ware is under way. The first stage is the production of a "masterplan" which will form the basis of the planning application which is expected to be submitted some time next year. The parish council, through Councillor Mike Ryan, has been represented at regular meetings of the masterplan steering group which consists of the District Council, the developers and Ware Town Council amongst others. The new development gives rise to a number of potential issues for Wareside including a possible increase in through traffic and consequent safety issues in the village for pedestrians. Through meetings with the District Council, the developers and others we are exploring ways in which some of these problems may be mitigated by, for example, road and pavement improvements and the provision of additional car parking. We are also taking the opportunity to explore whether some benefits may be brought to the

village such as better broadband and improvements to the village hall. If you have any thoughts on any of these issues please let us know wpcclerk@hotmail.co.uk

Finally, we are working with Ecologists from Herts County Council to prepare a land management plan for Little Oak Heath (the land behind Kingham Road). We are looking to improve biodiversity and want to make sure we manage the land sustainably for everyone to enjoy.

What to do now ...?

When I retired from work I had no doubt that I would find plenty of things to do. I had hobbies which I wanted to pursue and I planned to do some voluntary work. But I

Early Years children have been listening to and telling their own versions of traditional tales. The activities included making and tasting porridge and telephoning a certain 3 bears to apologise for the behaviour of a certain child. There was also a great deal of huffing and puffing heard from the class and apparently a Big, Bad Wolf was quizzed by some super sleuths!





Early October saw a visit from Legends Tennis who came into school to provide a free tennis session for Reception and Class 1. The children learnt and practised lots of new skills and had a great time whilst doing so.

Class 1 have also been busy learning all about how lighthouses work as well as building their own with lamps that actually light up, and reading the stories about a lighthouse keeper.

The children have been scientists, investigating different types of rocks and finding

out how fossils are formed.

Class 2 has been busy looking at coastal formations; they created salt dough to demonstrate the stages of coastal erosion.



As part of their science topic, gas, solid and liquids, the children measured the melting point of chocolate and investigated the air pockets of fruit and the effect this has to whether they sink or float.

Harvest

This year Wareside Primary School held their Harvest Festival Service on Thursday 17th October at Holy Trinity Church attended by all the children and many of their parents. At its' heart, our Service linked to The Bishop of St Albans" Light up Tanzania' Appeal.

'Light Up Tanzania' seeks to

bring electricity – in the form of solar panels – to around 350 households in the rural area of Singida, Tanzania.

Each class prepared a presentation with their teachers and thought about what life would be like without electricity.

The children of Early Years painted pictures of things that used electricity and thought about why light was important to them.

Children in Class 1 thought about what they would miss if they did not have electricity and wrote prayers to thank God for giving them electricity.

The older children imagined living in a village in Tanzania as solar panels had been installed and the difference it would make to their lives. One wrote: 'Some strangers came to my village ... and did something amazing! They gave us the gift of electricity'

As well as a time for thoughtful reflection and prayer, it was a joyful celebration of Harvest with songs and generous contributions of non-perishable foods for a local Food Bank.



There are many possible sequences for ringing a given number of bells: for eight bells the number of different sequences is 40,320. An experienced team will sometimes attempt to

ring a continuous set of changing sequences. Long ago it was decided that anything over 5,000 changes of sequence would be termed a "peal".



A peal typically takes around 3 hours so requires organisation and great concentration and stamina. Peals are rarely attempted, but when successfully achieved they may be recorded in the church on a "peal board" giving the bell-ringers' names and the title of the change sequence or method that was used.

As Christmas approaches, we are more likely to hear the distinctive sound of church bells. Most of our church towers were erected with the specific purpose of housing bells high above the rooftops so their sound could be heard over a wide area, calling people to worship or, sometimes, to celebrate a special occasion.

Church bells come in



many different sizes, the larger giving a deeper tone. Of Hundred Parishes churches, Saffron Walden has most bells with 12, the largest weighing over a ton. Some bells are extremely old: Great Waltham, Little Hallingbury, Little Hormead, Strethall and Westmill each have one dating from the 14th century.

Each bell is rung by a separate person, pulling gently but firmly on a bell rope from below. A practised team of bell ringers can create a wonderful sound as the bells are swung in a predetermined sequence. The simplest sequence is to ring the lightest bell first and so on through to the heaviest, producing a round of descending notes.


